# Co-ordinating and Subordinating Clauses

If the clauses make sense on their own they are called **co-ordinating** clauses.

The little kitten heard Jodie's voice so he purred softly and he moved towards her feet quickly.


If one clause depends on the other for its meaning then it is a subordinating clause.

I've brought you a present, she announced excitedly.

## The rule

When the subordinate (dependent) clause comes before the independent clause, use a comma to separate them.

As Jodie was listening to some music, her mum came into the room.

When the subordinate (dependent) clause comes after the independent clause we do not use a comma to separate them (most of the time!)

Jodie picked up her white stick in one hand before taking the wiggly kitten in the other.

(The exceptions are when we use ALTHOUGH/EVEN THOUGH/WHEREAS)

There cat was hungry, even though he's been fed not long ago.






